1944 - 2005

Auntie Hazel was always found in the middle of a group of people having fun... and usually instigating it. Her smile lit up every room she entered.

She started *Halau Po'okalani* to share her love for the Hawaiian culture. And share they did as she took them to perform at schools and events all over Arizona where they taught as much as they performed.

And no one has yet been able to match her ability to engage a crowd by telling Mother Goose stories in pidgin.
